James Peacock is Kenan Professor of Anthropology and Professor of Comparative Literature at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Grants and awards include Guggenheim, Rockefeller, the Thomas Jefferson award at UNC, the Franz Boas award of the American Anthropological Association, and Citizen of the World by the International Affairs Council. He was President of the American Anthropological Association and during 2003-2004 he was a fellow at the National Humanities Center. His field research is primarily in Indonesia and Appalachia. Publications include *The Anthropological Lens*, revised 2001; *Grounded Globalism: How the U.S. South Embraces the World*, 2007, and *Identity Matters: Ethnic and Sectarian Conflict*, 2007.
